Volunteers needed to speak for children

Here we are at the start of a new school year. And with the excitement of the opening of school, Erica Herman, executive director of Voices for Children of Broward County, is concerned about the “dark secret” some children have brought back to school along with their new uniforms and books.

The “dark secret,” she said, reveals signs of abuse and neglect many children have suffered over the summer, and are noticed by teachers and staff.

“Because children are subject to less adult supervision over the summer, it’s not uncommon for reports of suspected abuse and neglect to spike at the start of the school year,” Herman said.

She said many children confirmed as victims are removed from their homes and placed into foster care — often far from friends, families and schools.

This is where volunteers from Guardian ad Litem can be of great help, Herman said.

“These volunteers are specially screened and trained to speak up for abused and neglected children who, through no fault of their own, end up in the foster care system. Being uprooted from their homes and families is scary for these children and we want

to make sure they do not get lost in the overburdened foster care system.”

Herman said more people in the community are needed to speak up and make sure the children’s voices are heard, “and to help ensure that their stay in foster care is as short as possible and that they are placed in safe, loving homes quickly so they will begin to heal.”

Currently, more than 2,100 foster children have an advocate on their side, thanks to their ad litem volunteer.

“But,” Herman said, “there are more than 500 children currently unrepresented” by ad litem volunteers.

The unrepresented children are forced to go through the chaos of moving through the child protection system alone, Herman said.

“More volunteers are needed to step up and be a voice for children who desperately need them.”

COUPLE TRAVELS TO HAITI TO GET MUSIC CLASSES GOING

They pulled it off.

Several months ago, I made a plea for those of you who have workable musical instruments and sheet music to donate for a new musical program for children in Haiti.

Many of you responded. And on Aug. 16, Allison and Jason Novack traveled to Haiti to participate in the opening ceremonies to make music education available to children who did not otherwise have access to classes and musical instruments.

The Novacks are founders of 1308 Productions, a South Florida-based nonprofit organization devoted to public service, music education and supporting the development of the youth music scene, according to their website.

The couple brought dozens of new and used musical instruments and sheet music for beginners to help create a model music that can possibly be replicated in other communities.

I’m told it was a big day at City Hall in Tabarre, Haiti, where the Novacks were greeted by more than 150 children and about 100 adults in an outpouring of appreciation.

The Novacks told the audience about the value of music education for the future of the children in their communities. They said city officials made vows of sustained support by providing classroom

space, a music teacher, as well as maintenance and security for the instruments.

1308 Productions is planning another trip to Haiti in the near future to provide additional support to the music education and performance programs. There still is room for unused musical instrument or any other help you can provide.
